TEMPORARY CHANGE IN WATER DISINFECTION PROCESS COMPLETE

DESOTO COUNTY, Fla. (May 9, 2023) – The Peace River Manasota Regional Water Supply Authority will complete the temporary change in the disinfection process for its potable (drinking) water supply, including for customers of Charlotte County Utilities, DeSoto County Utilities, Sarasota County Utilities, City of North Port Utilities and City of Punta Gorda Utilities, on May 14, 2023 and return to its normal disinfectant.

From March 15, 2023 through May 14, 2023, the water was disinfected with free chlorine rather than chlorine combined with ammonia (chloramines). This conversion to free chlorine from chloramines allowed the above-mentioned utilities to perform a distribution system purge as recommended by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for water utilities using chloramines as their primary disinfectant. A "free chlorine conversion," as it is known, is a common practice by public water systems that use chloramines to periodically increase the level of disinfectant residual throughout the distribution system.

County and City Utilities will coordinate over the next week to convert back to chloramines as the disinfectant in the distribution system. Water will REMAIN SAFE TO DRINK throughout this process and boiling water is not necessary. Your local utility will flush the water distribution system in conjunction with this change in the process. The flush will allow the chloramine disinfectant to move quickly throughout the distribution system. Customers may notice a temporary change in the taste and smell of the water as the conversion process is completed. Homeowners should flush any cloudy or discolored water that may enter the plumbing by running a faucet for several minutes or until the water runs clear. Customers on kidney dialysis who use a proportioning machine to prepare dialysate at home are advised to contact their physician or equipment supplier to obtain the appropriate steps to accommodate the change in water disinfection and to install the proper filtering devices if needed.

Customers using the water for aquariums should monitor the chlorine residuals and are advised to contact a professional aquarist to ensure proper pretreatment of the water before adding or changing the water in the tank to avoid any problems associated with chlorine.
